THE POWER TO INSPIRE

In 1984, following my work with the Olympics, I was selected to travel as a media escort with the Olympic Gold Medallists and their parents on a Southland Corporation/USOC sponsored media tour. The kick-off was a breakfast in Los Angeles with President Ronald Reagan, and I was given the job of standing a few feet from the President and First Lady as each medallist was photographed with them.

As President Reagan approached the podium, I was moved to a position just in front of him. I remember feeling stunned and so honored to find myself standing in front of the President of the United States singing the National Anthem. The 1984 Olympic Tour included a ticker tape parade in New York with Mayor Koch. The patriotic expression of love that the crowd was showing for the athletes as they walked through the streets of the Big Apple brought us all to tears. I cried through the entire parade, listening to people yelling "America we love you", and waving back at people hanging from their office windows proudly holding little American flags.

It has always been obvious to me that following the dark period in our country when people felt frozen from the grief, shame and disillusionment of the assassination of four great leaders, the loss of life during the Viet Nam War, and the resignation of a President, that this gentle man from Illinois gave the American people back their sense of dignity and national pride.

As I watched the ceremony being televised
from the Rotunda, following the President's
death, once again I
could see his face, and
once again I was overcome with that same
patriotism he inspired
in me and everyone else
standing in the Century
Plaza ballroom that
morning in 1984. His

example of faith opened the hearts of men and women in America and throughout the world. How graced we all were to have known him.
